BOOK PROJECT	<i>Varieties of Globalization: Trade Openness, Bank Lobbying, and the Political Economy of Financial Market Development.</i> In my book project, I examine how a country’s integration into international trade shapes domestic banks’ incentives to lobby for financial market liberalization. I argue that trade-integrated banking sectors face a high-stakes trade-off: they can lobby for complete financial opening to benefit from global capital inflows, or retain government subsidies that sustain their exclusive domestic lending position. Countries with trade-integrated banks that are less dependent on government subsidies develop significantly more globalized financial markets (<i>Book Conference, Harvard University, April 18, 2025</i>).
